## Course Syllabus and Planner

### Course Overview

The CompuScholar **Web Design** curriculum is a one-year (two-semester) course covering required topics in most introductory “Web Design” classes. Students should have minimal computer usage skills (e.g. keyboarding, mouse, and operating system navigation, text file editing) prior to starting this course.

### Teaching Strategies

The course material is designed to appeal to a variety of students, from traditional learners who thrive on written text to audio-visual students who enjoy a multi-media format. All content is delivered through an online system that allows students to work seamlessly both in the classroom and at home.

### Labs and Programming Environment

Every chapter contains one or more hands-on programming labs where students will design or implement web pages to demonstrate understanding of the lesson topics. Students will get the opportunity to work on individual and group projects and will experience all phases of a project lifecycle, including requirements, design, implementation, and testing.

During the first semester, hands-on labs will be completed using simple text editors (e.g. Notepad or TextEdit) build into their Windows or Mac OS operating systems. We introduce the free, cross-platform Komodo Edit software during the second semester to provide advanced HTML editing features. Alternative IDEs may be used at teacher discretion.

## Course Planner

A typical school year consists of approximately 36 calendar weeks or 180 days of school. The course plan covers approximately 168 school days, with additional time allocated for review, make-up work, individual projects and Supplemental Lessons. Each “day” listed below represents one typical class period of 45 – 60 minutes, so students will typically work 3-5 hours per week. The suggested number of days factors in 1 day per lesson & quiz, 1 day per lab, and 1 day per test. Some classes may move faster or slower than the suggested pace.

Each chapter contains multiple lessons, quizzes and a chapter test in addition to the listed Lab assignments. **Completion of in-lesson “Work with Me” exercises is required in order to successfully finish the ongoing web site projects in each semester.** Teachers may utilize Supplemental Lessons as desired to meet state standards or student interest. Team Projects and other assignments may be adjusted to fit the available time.
